

LETTER FROM THE CHAPLAIN



Syracuse University has a long history in serving and embracing Muslim students, faculty and staff. The Harry S. Truman Scholarship



The Truman Scholarship was awarded this year to 59 exceptional college juniors in recognition of their community service, academic accomplishment and commitment to a career of public service. Since its creation in 1975, the Truman award has become the premier graduate scholarship for aspiring public service leaders in the United States .

Syracuse University junior Dina Eldawy has been named as 2018 recipients of this prestigious Truman Scholarship. Dina, former president of the Muslim Student Association, is pursuing a double major in international relations and citizenship and civic engagement, with a minor in Spanish. Specializing in Middle Eastern studies and international security and diplomacy, Dina interns at a local refugee education center in Syracuse, NY. Dina plans to earn a master's degree in conflict resolution or international development. Her career goals include working with USAID on foreign aid and development projects in the Middle East and Latin America.

Friday Lights: Surah al-Kahf, Jumu'ah, Coffee Hour, Breaking Bread Together, Tafsir Class

Given that Friday is a special day of week for Muslims, we are happy to enlighten it with many different programs and initiatives. Thus, we start with the first light, the light of chapter Al-Kahf. Students get together before Friday prayer and collectively enjoy recitation of this chapter. The Friday prayer and sermon follow. In the meantime, all visitors of Hendricks Chapel enjoy free coffee at People's Place, which is an act of Muslims' hospitality. Right after Friday prayer and sermon we break bread together and explore common and different grounds with each other. The lunch is served to everyone, Muslims and non-Muslims. This a great opportunity to build healthy relationships, develop positive attitudes towards each other, and build a community. This academic year we served more than 1050 free lunches to Syracuse University students, faculty and staff. After the lunch, the students were able to enjoy Tafsir Class and explore different themes and meaning of the Qur'an with Dr. Ahmed Malik.







What's Brewing with Muslim Chaplain

Morning coffee at Cafe Kubal is brewing every Thursday morning. According to many students, these coffee get-togethers were something special. Students were excited for every single Thursday morning and the new chapters of conversation. Initially, the Cup of Joe with Chaplain started with reverts to Islam, our sisters and brothers, who decided to start a new journey of their life. However, their attractive personalities pulled



together many other students, who engaged in productive discussions on various themes.

Understanding Islam Series at Bird Library

This six-week long series were started by Muslim Chaplain, Imam Amir Duric in collaboration with Syracuse University Libraries and Hendricks Chapel. It attracted over 30 participants of different faiths and backgrounds, who wanted to gain some appreciative knowledge about Islam. They wanted to understand Islam better and to engage in dialogue with Muslims. Each session had a presentation, discussion and Q&A part. Themes covered included pillars of Islam, articles of faith, misconceptions about Islam, Muslim culture and social activism, manners, and much more. This was a historic moment on campus given that such series were offered for the first time in this format. The last session of the series included a visit to local mosque. We plan to continue this collaboration with SU Libraries next semester and offer a new series on ethics, good character and well-being. Our intention is to make these two series an annual event in partnership with SU Libraries and other campus partners.



101 Qur'an and Tajweed Classes

Everyday, Monday-Friday before and after Dhuhr prayer Chaplain Amir Duric offered individual and small group sessions that help students' engagement and advancement with the Qur'an. These sessions range from very basic lessons of Arabic alphabet, and correct and fluent recitation of the Qur'an with tajweed rules.



Weekly Halagahs: Living the Iman & Imam Ghazali's Book of Knowledge

Goal of weekly halaqas/study circles was to bring smaller groups of students together where they have opportunity to gain deeper understanding of certain topics through collective reading, discussion and reflection. Usually, halaqah was facilitated by Chaplain, a student or another person who were able to ignite critical thinking about selected topics.

Accordingly, this academic year our students were able to participate in Wednesday study circle, "Become Successful by Living the Iman" that was facilitated by Chaplain Amir Duric. This halaqah helped students think about benefits of the knowledge and learned the differences between knowledge of the heart and knowledge of the tongue. One of the outcomes: the students learned how to transform their studies into worship of Allah (God) Almighty, and thus increase their Iman. This transformation enabled them to achieve success in both worlds, with Allah's will and permission.

Another study circle took place on Saturday mornings with Ahmet Celik, a PhD student in Department of Religion, who facilitated discussion around Imam Ghazali's Book of Knowledge.



Fun Nights: Tie & Die, Bowling Night, Trivia Nights, Soccer Night, Poetry Night, Movie Nights

All these activities were ice breakers, which helped students connect with each other while staying in a safe and healthy environment. These activities enabled students to build a community and have fun.











Workshops: Dating & Marriage in Islam

These workshop sessions were intended to overcome some misconceptions about dating and marriage from Islamic perspective. The workshop helped students explore dating and marriage related topics that are very important but often taboos in Muslim communities. Yet, our students were able to share their expectations about future spouses, learn more about the process of getting to know each other, and develop a framework and understanding of a healthy marriage.






The Second Annual Syracuse Community Iftar

Muslim Student Life at SU was actively involved in planning, sponsoring and organizing the Second Annual Syracuse Community Iftar. Imam Amir Duric was the catalyst for bringing the larger Muslim community together and leading the organization of this beautiful event. Even though this is the second community iftar, it is the first of its kind, as all local Muslim organizations participated in the Iftar in collaboration with Syracuse University and the City of Syracuse. More than 600 guest from various backgrounds and faith traditions attended, shared meal together and exchange contact information with the goal to build a greater community. Our goal is to move this event to the Carrier Dome next year, make it an annual event, and increase the number of guest above 1,000.

Open House for Friday Prayer and MSA Room

At the beginning of the Fall semester we held an Open House once a month inviting everyone to the Friday Prayer and the MSA room. The Open House gave our non-Muslim peers, faculty and staff the opportunity to observe, ask questions, and learn more about Islam and Muslims. The Open House was a success and it transformed into a weekly Friday event, namely during and after the Jumu'ah all Hendricks Chapel visitors were treated with free coffee and were welcome to join the Muslims for a free lunch after the prayer. Friday Jumu'ah has become a bridge building tool for Muslims and non-Muslims at Syracuse University.

Public Lecture by Ermin Sinanovic, Ph.D. (Maxwell School Alumnus)

Dr. Sinanovic was our guest lecturer in November. He delivered a public lecture, "The Great Interregnum: Islam and Muslims in the 21st Century." This gave attendees an excellent picture about Muslims

in America, their past, present and future.



Workshop on Islam and Modernity

Considering that our students are the leaders of our community, this day long workshop helped students recognize and develop their leadership skills. Through the first sermon of Abu Bakr they learned about importance of context, audience, and justice when appointed to high impact and responsible positions.



Seerah Conference

Students had opportunity to reflect upon and learn about different aspects of the Prophet's life from various speakers. Each speaker emphasized on various roles that the Prophet had, as we read in the Qur'an: "Our Lord, send among them a messenger from themselves who will recite to them Your verses and teach them the Book and wisdom and purify them..." (Qur'an, 2:129) Students became inspired, motivated and empowered through the examples from the Prophet's life, particularly his approach to young adults.



Public Lecture and Workshop on Islamophobia by Anisa Diab

Anisa Diab is a professional public counselor. She created a safe space, in which students were able to express themselves and share their experiences of trauma related to Islamophobia. Additionally, she offered valuable practical advice and taught the students practical skills in terms of how to react when one is facing Islamophobia, or how to become an ally and help someone who is facing it in one's presence.



Public Lecture and Visit of Imam Khalid Latif

We were honored to host Imam Khalid Latif who is the Muslim Chaplain at NYU and NYPD.. He spoke about importance of justice in the time of injustice with the focus on Rohingya Muslims, their lives, and their needs. He called attendees to think about individual and collective responsibility toward not just other Muslims, but other human beings. Given that Allah ordered justice, he addressed the questions about how we can live justly, and justly distribute our time, wealth and other blessings. Following the lecture, our students were able to have a dinner with Imam Khalid and discuss various issues of contemporary world.












Reception at Chancellor's House

Demystifying Religion/ Chaplains Panel
